Bernard Matthews faces 'illegal' imports inquiry

► Turkeys came from bird-flu hit Hungary

Disclosure threatens £400m-a-year business

Bernard Matthews is under investigation by the Government amid concerns that the company has imported poultry from inside an avian flu exclusion zone in Hungary, it emerged last night.

The company, Britain's largest turkey producer, is also being investigated for breaking EU hygiene regulations by leaving processed poultry outside sheds on its food processing site at Suffolk, where a lethal strain of bird flu was detected last week, according to senior

Whitehall sources. Another three of the units of the 22 at the Bernard Matthews farm in Holton, Suffolk, have tested positive for H5N1, it emerged last night, raising fears that the virus was more entrenched than originally hoped. Government scientists will be looking at establishing how the virus spread from hut to hut, or whether all four huts suffered separate, independent infections from the same source.

The Government has found that the strain of the virus in both countries may well be identical. If the imported birds were infected with the H5N1 strain, this virus could easily have been picked up by wild birds and rats, which may have contaminated the chicks in one of the 22 sheds on the site at Holton.

The initial report by veterinary scientists into the conditions of the plant where 160,000 turkey chicks were gassed this week may prove serious for Bernard Matthews and his £400 million-a-year business.

The investigation also poses questions about the practices employed by the £3.4 billion British Continued on page 4, col 1

From today, New York's own star-gazing couple, Starsky + Cox (Stella Starsky and Quinn Cox, partners in life, love and business, sextrologers to the beau monde, including Marc Jacobs, Mario Testino and Scarlett Johansson), will be ready to sort out your love life, work life or any other troubling little problems at Selfridges, just beside the stationery department. Their Cosmic Love and Sex Clinic runs until Wednesday Valentine's Day, in case you missed the connection.

Love is what they're about on this occasion ... how to make it better if you have it, how to find it if you don't. What most of us really want to know, of course, is whether we will live happily ever after, but Starsky + Cox aren't into the prediction business. They pull up your birth chart (instantly, from a computer once you've given them your date, time and place of birth) and then start talking to find out what is troubling you.

"Generally what we do," they say (they're a double act and it's hard to remember who said what) "is to try to get people to understand their strengths and weaknesses and what they can do to punch up in their lives. We're where psychology meets astrology. We study the birth signs [of which incidentally they believe there are 24 - a

masculine and feminine version of the usual 12] and typically look at Venus and Mars and work out how to use people's own power to help themselves".

Don't go along expecting an hour-long session something between five and 15 minutes is more likely, though it's free and you just walk in, hoping for a slot. But Starsky + Cox tell me that they can do a lot in a short amount of time and if you check out starskyandcox.com, you will see that they offer consultations by phone, mail, and e-mail, and send out astrological charts. And if you can't make it to Selfridges, Starsky + Cox have produced a comprehensive guide to all things astrological, amorous and sexual called Sextrology (£14.99 from Ebury Press). No sexual proclivity or psychological peculiarity is left uncatered for. As Time magazine put it — it's a "deft melding of high-mindedness and raunch"

Not that this is Selfridges' first foray into the world of psychic services. A year ago it launched the Psychic Sisters, Jayne Wallace and Lindy Murray, so that for £60 an hour troubled shoppers could deal with the sort of problems that buying a new Prada handbag simply can't solve (jaynewallace.co.uk). It proved such a success that Harrods has followed suit, and the Psychic Sisters are proliferating fast - there are five now - with some available at Harrods' Urban Retreat and some at Selfridges. Meanwhile, also at Harrods, there is also a "professional intuitive" where, for £120, you can acquire some "personal guidance and confidence boosting". I've yet to call but a not entirely empathetic friend reports that it "was spookily impressive".
